I didn't really learn too much as they had me pushing a wheel barrow and cleaning up for three years and, as a reward, I was laid off. Not being able to find a job, I boosted my name in the draft and was inducted in the army in 1963. I served 18 months in Germany and was eventually discharged in 1965. I went back to my Mom & Dad's home in Niles. My uncle, who lived in Northbrook, told me they were building a house across the street from him and I should go over and ask for a job, which I did. I told the foreman I was a journeyman but didn't really know much about construction. We talked a bit and he offered me a job and to start working the next morning. I ended up working for that company for 43 years! I found out, many years later, that the foreman had served in the army during WWII and received many medals. He took me under his wing and taught me everything. I had met a gal on New Years Eve in 1965. Married her in '67. We have two children. A boy 42 and a girl 39. 
Grea's 6-B report card below Class president AND hall guard, WOW!

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I Have Good News and **Bad News**

First the bad news. The CPSAlumni.org website is no longer available due to financial reasons. It had been funded b y endowment from the J.P.Sloan Foundation and that funding has run out. At this time, there are no resources to keep it active. It has been a wonderful source of material for the MoosMates newsletter and will be sorely missed. We have found names and dates and school information for many of us kids, these past 30 issues.

Now the good news.

The MoosMates has downloaded almost every school record available from the beginning, which was 1893, thru 1973, which is the last year of which the records are available to the public, so, for any of you out there, I will share what I have if you are ever so in need of any information therein.

The Myth Debunked Some of may remember or, have heard of this myth about Lucky Strikes and here's the true story.

The brand's signature dark green pack was changed to white in 1942. In a famous advertising campaign that used the slogan "Lucky Strike Green has gone to war", the company claimed the change was made because the copper used in the green color was needed for World War II. American Tobacco actually used chromium to produce the green ink, and copper to produce the gold-colored trim. A limited supply of each was available, and substitute materials made the package look drab. However, the truth of the matter was that the white package was introduced to modernize the label and to increase the appeal of the package among female smokers; market studies showed that the green package was not found attractive to women, who had become an important consumer of tobacco products. The war effort became a convenient way to make the product more marketable while appearing patriotic at the same time. Famed industrial designer Raymond Lowey was challenged by company president George Washington Hillto improve the existing green and red package, with a \$50,000 bet at stake. Loewy changed the background from green to white, making it more attractive to women as well as cutting printing costs by eliminating the need for green dye. He unforgiving, as I recall. Let me know also placed the Lucky Strike target logo on both sides of the package, a move that increased both visibility and sales. Hill paid off the bet.
